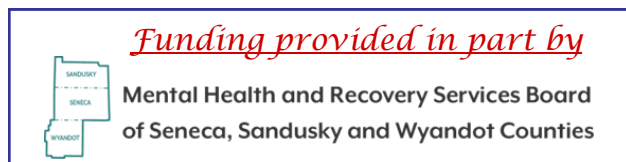

CIT—Who We Are

The Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) Model is a solution focused community response to helping people in a mental health crisis. CIT programs bring stakeholders together from the law enforcement, behavioral health and advocacy sectors, along with people with lived experience with mental illness, to develop solutions for safely re-directing people in crisis away from the judicial system and into the health care system whenever appropriate.

Benefits of CIT Program

CIT is a Safety Course that gives you more tools to safely and effectively de-escalate a crisis situation. CIT also:

- Improves community relationships
- Improves crisis response to an altered mental health status call
- Reduces arrests and use of force
- Reduces officer/citizen injuries
- Reduces liability
- Cost savings by more efficient use of criminal justice and community resources

NAMI SSW and Terra State Community College partnered in establishing the Northwest Ohio Crisis Intervention Team Training Center to increase training opportunities in the region for law enforcement, first responders and other individuals in need of crisis intervention and de-escalation skills. A Certified CIT officer completes 40 hours of training covering a variety of topics including:

- Recognizing symptoms of psychiatric substance use disorders
- Practical de-escalation techniques to increase officer safety
- Special topics including Autism and trauma in children
- Legal cases related to mental health and substance abuse
- PTSD and suicide in the ranks
- Live role playing techniques

The core elements of the Memphis Model of CIT first responder training include:

- 1) 40 hours of in-classroom training
- 2) Training to recognize and respond to a mental health crisis
- 3) Improve Tactics and De-escalation Skills
- 4) Practicum
- 5) Develop Community Partnerships
- 6) Data Collection
- 7) Advanced Training Opportunities
- 8) CIT Champion Award
