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Introduction

The Criminal Justice Coordinating Center of Excellence (CJ CCoE) at Northeast Ohio Medical University (NEOMED) administered state funding provided through the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (OMHAS) for the *Ohio CIT Support and Expansion Project* from January 1, 2020, through June 30, 2021.

The project provided support for local and statewide CIT program growth and development, including, but not limited to scholarships and grants for CIT training, CIT program development awards to Ohio county and multi-county CIT programs, statewide training opportunities for partner groups, updated statewide strategic planning, technical assistance opportunities, and more.

This report provides an overview of the accomplishments that occurred throughout Ohio's CIT programs and substantiates the crucial changes and opportunities made as a direct result of this generous funding. A few noteworthy accomplishments directly associated with the availability of state funding include:

- There was a substantial increase of 311% in advanced, refresher, and partner stakeholder CIT courses compared to the prior 18 months (July 2018-December 2019). These are courses addressing special topics to enhance the knowledge and skillsets of CIT officers and key partners, such as de-escalation skills, autism spectrum disorder, and emergency hospitalization.
 - ✓ Ohio's statewide CIT Advanced Training Conference saw a 145% increase in attendance from the prior year, 2019. The conference was held virtually with two nationally renowned speakers; Gabe Howard and Adam Timm., as well as a special opening with Governor Mike DeWine. Increased collaboration with local and state partners, e.g., inclusion of Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction and a public safety telecommunicator supervisor on the planning committee resulted in expanded conference offerings, ensuring there were options for law enforcement, public safety telecommunicators, CIT coordinators, and corrections officers. The workshop offerings for corrections and public safety telecommunicators were firsts of their kind.
 - ✓ 123 individuals from Ohio programs attended the virtual 2020 CIT International Conference
- Jurisdictions across Ohio focused on the development of CIT policies and procedures. 58 law enforcement jurisdictions either revised or developed crisis intervention policies for the first time, increasing the number of agencies self-reporting such policies by 43%. To aid in this effort, law enforcement consultants in collaboration with the CJ CCoE published the *Crisis Intervention Law Enforcement Policy Guide* and *Addendum Policy Guide for Public Safety Telecommunicators*. The creation of these materials offers policy direction from both law enforcement and public safety telecommunicator perspectives and will provide guidance to communities, making it likely there will be more growth in this area next project cycle.
- Strides were made to increase or enhance involvement of communities:
 - ✓ Ashland County, which does not host CIT training or sponsor a CIT program, sent twelve sworn law enforcement officers to CIT trainings in a nearby county. Ashland County Sheriff's Office and Loudonville Police Department also implemented crisis intervention policies.

- ✓ After several years of offering a 2-day mental health course for law enforcement and one year of a 32-hour training, Columbiana County conducted its first 40-hour CIT patrol officer course to align with the Core Elements of CIT.
- ✓ Huron County renewed involvement in CIT by joining Seneca, Sandusky, Wyandot, Erie, and Ottawa Counties in the first multi-ADAMHS Boards CIT program, coordinated by NAMI Seneca, Sandusky, and Wyandot. This regional, six-county CIT program in northwest Ohio also developed a hybrid training during the pandemic, involving multiple statewide stakeholders in its development and evaluation.
- With emphasis on the importance of co-coordination of CIT programs, particularly between law
 enforcement and mental health partners, the project resulted in 91 new CIT coordinators: six from
 mental health, one in the emergency medical services field, and 84 from law enforcement agencies.
 These new coordinators, identified during a critical period of social unrest appear to have enhanced
 relationships between law enforcement and mental health at a time when communities across the
 country were struggling.
- Several CIT programs developed dedicated CIT training sites, which will offer a reliable and suitable place to sustain CIT training.
- Eight CIT programs developed marketing and public relations strategies to increase public awareness of CIT and the shared nature of crisis response between mental health providers and law enforcement. The creation of these campaigns broadens the public's knowledge of CIT and assists in understanding the roles that law enforcement may have in crisis response. See photos below.





The achievements highlighted above and throughout this report were made possible by the generous funding provided through OMHAS and the dedicated CIT Coordinators and stakeholders across Ohio.

Appendix A – Overview of Crisis Intervention Team Training Statistics

Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) programs are a partnership between law enforcement, the mental health system, and mental health advocacy groups. The training component within CIT programs is a collaborative effort, providing intensive instruction, designed to help law enforcement officers identify and respond to individuals with mental illness who are in crisis.

CIT Officers can be found in all Ohio counties.

The Ohio CIT Support and Expansion Project spanned 18 months, from January 1, 2020, through June 30, 2021. In this timeframe, CIT programs across Ohio held 156 trainings, where over 61% (54/88) of Ohio's counties hosted trainings and 90% (79/88) of counties sent professionals to receive training. To illustrate the effect of these funds on Ohio's CIT programs, below are the outcomes compared with the prior 18 months advanced, refresher, and partner stakeholders' courses, followed by the same comparison for full courses. A 20-year full course statistics table is presented at the end.

These courses were a high priority for many CIT Programs. They are shorter in length and present a variety of topics and information beyond the full 40-hour training. The above comparison illustrates the impact of this project on the availability of newer course content within CIT Programs across Ohio. There was a substantial increase of 311% compared to the prior 18 months. These outcomes paired with the full course momentum made a distinct impact on CIT.

Although the full course statistics are higher in the previous 18-month timespan, the COVID-19 Pandemic and resulting State of Emergency response, beginning in early March of 2020, halted most trainings until June 2020. This 3+month hiatus in training was quickly recovered due to the availability of state funds which allowed for an increased use of technology and redesigned training spaces. With safety in mind, CIT Programs created hybrid training innovations and reduced attendance sizes in socially distanced courses, which ultimately sustained the training momentum.

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






2020 CIT Program Level Baseline Data





2020 CIT Program Level Baseline Data










CIT Training, Trainer, and/or Speaker Development (continued) All Program Level




























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Appendix G – Ohio CIT Support and Expansion Project: Additional Accomplishments

Virtual Innovations

Advanced, Refresher, or Partner Stakeholder Trainings

The Northwest Ohio (NWO) CIT Program and the CJ CCoE created an online hybrid training course for use in the NWO 6-county region. Its completion is scheduled for November 2021.

Question Persuade Refer (QPR) for Law Enforcement Training

200 virtual QPR for Law Enforcement training slots were made available to sworn law enforcement officers. In three months, 141 sworn law enforcement officers completed the training from 20 counties.



Virtual Technical Assistance Learning Sessions
