CENTER FOR INNOVATIVE PRACTICES

The Center for Innovative Practices (CIP) is a technical-assistance organization within the Begun Center for Violence Prevention, Research & Education at the Jack, Joseph and Morton Mandel School of Applied Social Sciences (school of social work) at Case Western Reserve University. The Center for Evidence-Based Practices (CEBP) at Case Western Reserve University is a technical assistance organization that provides consulting, training, and evaluation for the implementation and integration of evidence-based practices and other behavioral healthcare innovations that improve outcomes and quality of life for adults with mental illness, substance abuse, and co-occurring disorders.

Public-Academic Partnership

The Center for EBP is a partnership between the Jack, Joseph and Morton Mandel School of Applied Social Sciences (school of social work) at Case Western Reserve University and the Department of Psychiatry at the Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine. The partnership is in collaboration with and supported by the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services (OhioMHAS) and Ohio Department of Medicaid (ODM).



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BEST PRACTICES IN SCHIZOPHRENIA TREATMENT (BeST) CENTER

The Best Practices in Schizophrenia Treatment (BeST) Center is a technical assistance organization within the Department of Psychiatry at Northeast Ohio Medical University (NEOMED). The mission of the BeST Center is to promote recovery and improve the lives of as many people with schizophrenia as possible by accelerating the adoption of evidence-based practices and other promising interventions. To achieve its mission, the BeST Center offers training, consultation,

and evaluation to help build the capacity of local systems to provide state-of-the-art care.

University-Community Partnership

The BeST Center was established in the Department of Psychiatry at NEOMED in 2009 through a generous grant from The Margaret Clark Morgan Foundation of Hudson, Ohio. The BeST Center also receives support from a variety of public and private funders.



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OHIO CRIMINAL JUSTICE COORDINATING CENTER OF EXCELLENCE

The Ohio Criminal Justice Coordinating Center of Excellence (CJ CCoE) is a technical assistance organization within the Department of Psychiatry at Northeast Ohio Medical University (NEOMED). The mission of the CJ CCoE is to encourage communities throughout Ohio to forge collaborative relationships between the mental health and criminal justice systems. The goal of the CJ CCoE is for each county in Ohio to develop an array of programs that will divert people with mental disorders from jail and keep them in treatment.

University-Community Partnership

The CJ CCoE was established in May 2001 to promote jail diversion alternatives. It is funded by the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services and the Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services Board of Summit County. The Center works collaboratively with the National Alliance on Mental Illness of Ohio, the Ohio Office of Criminal Justice Services, and Mental Illness.



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
