2023 Ohio Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) Conference: Seeing CIT Growth Across Ohio

The annual Ohio Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) Conference drew over 160 attendees representing the fields of mental health, criminal justice, law enforcement, and advocacy. Approximately 40 Ohio CIT Programs across the state serving 47 counties had representatives attend the conference in Columbus.

Opening remarks were led by Ruth Simera, Executive Director of the Coordinating Centers of Excellence in the Department of Psychiatry at the Northeast Ohio Medical University (NEOMED). The opening keynote address *Building the Bridges for Mental Health* was delivered by Matt Dorgan, President and Founder of <u>Building Bridges for Brianna</u>, an organization based in Pennsylvania that promotes suicide awareness and prevention, funds suicide awareness and prevention programs, supports those in need and families dealing with mental health issues. Matt discussed his experience of the loss of his daughter to suicide and the creation of Building Bridges for Brianna, including mobilizing a one-time suicide prevention awareness event into a movement for his community and the compassionate acts of CIT officers on the day of his daughter's death. The morning



breakout sessions were *The Impact of Trauma on the Brain: Healing Our Communities* (NiCole Thomas, LPCC-S), *Mitigating Crisis in a Correctional Setting* (Teresa Russell), and *Interacting with a Person Experiencing Psychosis* (Dr. Deb Hrouda, Ph.D., and Dr. Doug Smith, M.D., DFLAPA).



The 2023 Ohio CIT Awards were presented by Lois Hochstetler, Assistant Director for Community Treatment Services at OhioMHAS, and retired Ohio Supreme Court Justice Evelyn Stratton. When commenting on the Ohio CIT Awards, Luke Russell, Executive Director of NAMI Ohio, stated "The CIT Award winners reflect the work being done each week to bring together law enforcement leaders and personnel to better engage individuals with mental illness and their families. The efforts by Ohio's CIT programs not only helps people in crisis, NAMI Ohio believes it saves lives." Over 50 nominations for awards were submitted from community members and CIT partners across Ohio. All nominees and award winners were recognized at this year's event. After the awards ceremony and lunch, the afternoon breakout sessions were *Stopping the Revolving Door* (Betsy Johnson and Bradley Tarr), *So You Say You are a CIT Coordinator, Now What?* (Kimberly Farrier) and *Changing the Outlook for Law Enforcement De-Escalation Training in America* (Ret. Chief Paul Hartinger). The closing plenary session, *Lived Experience: A Journey Through the Challenges of Mental Illness,* was delivered by Ohio resident and advocate Cory Dobbelaere. Through his personal story, Cory shared how he navigated his own journey with mental illness, prison, mental health hospitalizations, homelessness, and gaps in outpatient mental health treatment. A strong supporter of NAMI and other advocacy organizations, Cory made sure all attendees heard his message while also getting a few laughs.



Technical Assistance Session
Training Goals and Performance Objectives for CIT Training
Friday, June 30, 2023
10AM-11AM

This Technical Assistance (TA) session will focus on creating training goals and performance objectives and provide samples of both. Goals, like a compass, provide the general direction of the training course. Performance objectives, like a GPS device, provide detailed directions to reach the goal and identify what the learner will do when back on the job, along with how proficiency will be measured. All CIT courses must have training goals tied to the overall goals of Ohio CIT and require performance objectives so that learners know what knowledge and skills they will obtain after completing the training. Performance objectives will be discussed using the concept of backward design. This concept identifies what a person will do after training, called the behavior within a performance objective, first and then adds the other two objective elements. Along with a discussion of these concepts, presenters will also introduce an upcoming publication that will be released to CIT coordinators to assist them in building and integrating training goals and performance objectives into CIT programs.


CJ CCoE Reader's Corner

Both books are centered around personal stories, addressing mental health and suicide. One is fiction based on true events of the author, and the other is a memoir.

It's Kind of a Funny Story by Ned Vizzini (2007)

-Vizzini wrote this after being hospitalized for severe depression. It is a fictionalized account of his real experiences, where he is portrayed by Craig, a young man who has made his way to a hospital after revealing he is thinking about harming himself. Throughout the book Craig takes us through his thoughts, which are filled with his hopes and fears for the present and future. I think the most sobering part of this book is reading the foreword and discovering that the author completed suicide several years after this book was published. His perspective throughout this book is immensely relatable and offers distinctive insight into one person's struggle with mental health.





Furiously Happy by Jenny Lawson (2017)

- Jenny Lawson is a blogger, author, and comic. This book is one in a series of personal accounts she has written where she candidly shares her logic as she moves through the world. Lawson is known for being open about her struggles with mental health. Her activism works to reduce stigma around mental health. Her approach keeps you guessing, and I found her amusing and her stories very relatable even when she was talking about something I had never experienced.
